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A Note on References and Sources

Appendix 8 of *The Origins and Early History of the Société Franco-Anglaise de Cardiff* contains an overview of the references and sources used in compiling this history. However, it was noted there that the newspaper references to the two societies (Société Franco-Anglaise de Cardiff and the L'Entente Cordiale Association of London) are so numerous that it was decided to print them as a separate supplement to the history. This supplement therefore comprises these references, in chronological order, as Appendices 9 and 10.

It should be noted that much of the information about these two societies (and in the case of the L'Entente Cordiale society practically the whole of the information) can *only* be found in the newspaper records. Hence these final two appendices (9 and 10) contain *essential* information for their study.

It is intended that these appendices will be updated from time to time as fresh references become available.

Appendix 9: Chronological References to the Société Franco-Anglaise de Cardiff

These references are listed in chronological order. The main sources are the Western Mail (WM), the Evening Express (EE), and the South Wales Daily News (SWDN). There are a few other references and in these cases the name of the newspaper will be given in full.

I have used some abbreviations: SFA for Société Franco-Anglaise, PB for Paul Barbier, PP for Park Place. The date in square brackets [] following an item refers to the date that the event took place, which is usually different from the date on which the item appeared in the newspaper.

References to Professor Paul Barbier prior to the Founding of the SFA

About 200 lectures, visits and lessons are arranged for the period of 2 July to 31 August. Many distinguished Professors of the Faculty of Paris will take part. At the end of the course the students may sit an examination which could lead to the award of either a *diplôme supérieur* or a *diplôme élémentaire*. The fee for the course will be £6 10s.

Letter in the Barbier Archives, dated 14 Apr 1897, from the Alliance Française in Paris, to "Mr. le Président de l'Université Collège de Cardiff". Request to display posters relating to Cours de Vacances in 1896 and 1897 in the University.

Report on the committees for the 1899 Eisteddfod. The Literary Committee has the Marquess of Bute, Mons. P Barbier et al.

The Times, Mon 12 April 1898 p.4.

Letter from Paul Barbier, Cardiff, headed "Holiday Instruction in French". This letter publicises the same programme of lectures and visits on French language and culture in Paris as in his previous letter of 11 May 1896. This time he describes himself "As délégué of the Alliance Française".

Paul Barbier is hon. secretary of a movement to present the consul [Trobiand] with a work of art to be selected by Madame Trobiand. The presentation probably at the Exchange on Monday. [Mon 10 Oct 1898]

England and France comprised the heart and mind of intellectual Europe, and were the pioneers of Western civilization. In the premises in which they were assembled the members would hold meetings, and would find French and English periodicals, as well as French classical literature. It was intended that lectures should be given on social and literary subjects, and that information should be supplied to English and French merchants on the commercial possibilities of the district. After an address by the Lord Mayor (Alderman Robert Hughes), Mr H Wood-Davey (ex-president of the Cardiff Chamber of Commerce), speaking in French, heartily approved the objects of the society." Appendix 10: Chronological References to the L'Entente Cordiale Society: Anglo-French Association of London

These references are listed in chronological order. The main source is The Times. There are references in a few other newspapers and journals. Where the date of an article is different from the date of the particular event which it deals with, the entry is placed according to the date of the event.

The *L'Entente Cordiale* Society was active during the period 1896-1922. The Times used several variants on its name, the main ones being L'Entente Cordiale or the Anglo-French Association. I will reflect this in each reference and, for brevity, I will denote Anglo-French Association by AFA and Entente Cordiale by EC.

During the period 1922-1948 the activities of *L'Entente Cordiale* were taken over by the *United Associations of Great Britain and France*. Regular reports on the United Associations appeared in The Times. In 1944-45 the United Associations were re-formed and renamed, at the request of the British government, as the *Franco-British Society*. Again, regular reports continued to appear in the Times. I have included a sample of references up to 1990, the date at which James Hadley retired as chairman.

Report on disastrous fire in Paris. "Telegrams of condolences have been received by the Prefect of the Senate from the Chairman of the LCC, and by President Faure from the Entente Cordiale Society in London."
